What we know



Health care choice means you can choose

what happens to your body.



Examples of health care choices are to

- take medicines
- have a surgery
- have a blood test.



Many people

- can
- want to

make their own health care choices.



There are rules that say

- everyone should have health care choices
- everyone should get information they understand
- health care workers must give this information.



Each country has different rules.



In Australia, one of the rules



• is the Healthcare Charter of Rights.

Health care workers should help people

• make their own health care choices.



Health care workers are

- doctors
- nurses
- other health care people.



Health care workers must give information

• that people can understand.



• make their own health care choices.



People should make choices they want.

Saying no is also a choice.



Many people with intellectual disability

- have bad experiences with health care
- do not get to make health care choices.



We need to find out

- why these problems still happen
- how we can fix them.



This way we can make health care better

for people with intellectual disability.

What we did



GeneEQUAL looked at what researchers

 already know about how people make health care choices.

GeneEQUAL wanted to know what

- helps
- does not help

people make their own health care choices.



Researchers are people

• who find more about different things.

Researchers have already asked different people

• about health care choices.

GeneEQUAL looked at this research.



We looked at 88 research studies.

23 studies were about

 how people make their own health choices.

From these studies we found six ideas.



We worked with researchers with intellectual disability to



- check the ideas
- make this Easy Read summary
- plan how to share our ideas



We will now talk about the ideas we found.

What we found out

Idea 1 is about health care workers.



Many health care workers do not

- know how to support people
- treat people fairly
- give options to people

when they make health care choices.



There are rules that say health care workers

- should help people make their own choices
- must treat people as equals
- must give information to help people make choices
- must make reasonable adjustments.






Reasonable adjustments are things health care workers

 can do to make things easier for people.





- give Easy Read information
- book longer appointment times
- use plain English
- explain things in different ways.







Many health care workers do not

- follow these rules
- give health information that people can understand
- treat people with respect
- give people choices.



This makes it very hard

for people to make a health choice.



Health care workers need more training to

- do good health care
- explain things in plain English
- help people make their own choices.

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Idea 2 is about health information people can understand.



People need information they can understand

• so they can make their own

health care choices.



Many people are given

- no information
- not enough information
- information that is hard to understand.



This makes it hard to make health care choices.




Some health care workers give information

• to carers or a support person

but not to the person.





- to the person
- that the person can understand
- in many different ways

so the person can make health care choices.

One way is to give Easy Read information

 to help people understand their health care choices.



Idea 3 is about the choice of a support person.



Support people can help

- talk to health care workers
- explain health information to the person
- support people's feelings
- remember important information.



This can help people make health care choices.



But some people with intellectual disability think

• support people can make it harder

to make health care choices.



Some support people

- think the person can not make choices
- do not listen to the person's choices
- do not let the person make a choice.



Some doctors and nurses

- only talked to the support person
- only listened to the support person

when making a health choice for someone else.

Lots of people did not like this.



Idea 4 is about problems in the health system.





People sometimes need more

- time to think
- appointments

to make health care choices.

Health care workers need more time to







People want support to make health care choices.



- a telephone number to call
- a website

for more health care information.





Health care workers want more

- time to spend with people
- training about how to explain things
- resources
- health system rules

to help people make health care choices.

Idea 5 is about how to support the needs of different people.



Some people find it harder than others

to make choices.



This can be because they

- did not make health choices before
- did not know they can make health choices
- had bad health care experiences in the past
- find it hard to speak up.



People might

- say they understand information
- agree with a choice

when they actually do not.



Health care workers should

- check people understand the information
- remind people they have choices
- ask people if they need extra help
- give extra help to people who find it hard

to support them to make health care choices.





Health care workers can

- give people a chance to speak up
- give choices people can understand
- respect people's choices
- listen to people, not just their support person

to give extra help.

Idea 6 is about how health care workers should know how to communicate.



Health care workers must know how to

talk with people.



This means they give information the person can

- understand
- use to make health choices.



For example health care workers can

- use simple and short words
- say important bits many times
- use pictures to explain things
- use Easy Read booklets.



Health care workers should

communicate in different ways

to support the person's needs.





They can use

- words to talk
- sign language
- picture boards
- body language

to help people make their own health choices.

How we can make things better



It is important that we teach health care workers

how to support people

to make their own health care choices.







We must teach health care workers how to

- use different ways to communicate
- give choices to people
- explain things so people can understand
- check people understand the information

so people can make their own choices.



Health care workers must

ask people how they prefer to communicate.



Many people have bad experiences with health care.



Because of this they

- do not trust doctors
- avoid going to the doctor
- find it hard to talk about health care.



Health care workers need to

- understand how bad experiences can affect people
- support people after bad experiences
 when they make their own health care choices.



We call this trauma-informed care.



For example, doctors and nurses need to

tell people they have choices



- ask people what they want
- get to know the person



use words that are respectful and positive.



Health care workers need to be taught how

- they can do trauma-informed care
- to do reasonable adjustments
- use Easy Read health information

to better help people make choices.







We also need to find out more about

- how people make health choices
- what people think about health choices.



This should be inclusive research.



Inclusive research is when researchers

work together with people with intellectual disability

to find out more.



This will mean we can

- teach health care workers to support people better
- help people make their own health care choices.
